
URBAN





Here's the really great thing about nature centers: They offer the best features of parks, zoos, and museums all in one place. Way more than just a walk in the woods, these educational institutions get kids up close and personal with the animals and plants that call them home. And you don't need to head way out into the country to reap their rewards—many are located in protected lands smack-dab in the middle of urban areas. Check out five of the most kid-friendly options.

BLUFF LAKE NATURE CENTER Denver

This western city's largest open space gives you a chance to enjoy the outdoors in five distinct habitats: lake, wetlands, shortgrass prairie, riverbanks, and wetland woodland. This means that your family can catch a glimpse of a huge variety of creaturesfrom beavers to owls to foxes. Bonus: The center's website (blufflake.org) features videos from its wildlife cameras, so kids can check out their new furry friends long after they've gone home. Also available: preschool programs, family exploration hikes, and bird walks, as well as sunset viewings by the lake.



STAMFORD MUSEUM & NATURE CENTER Stamford, CT

No need to party till the cows come home-they're already here! Kids love hanging out with the animals at Heckscher Farm at this 118-acre nature center in the middle of the state's third-largest city. The whole family will also enjoy exhibits on history, science, and pop culture in the museum. And don't forget to stick around after dark and try to spot constellations and planets with the observatory's 22-inch research telescope. More than 80 forested acres of trails and family festivals in March, May, and October provide extra fun!



CINCINNATI NATURE CENTER Cincinnati

Mother Nature has been extragood to Cincinnati, with two beautiful locations for its nature center–Rowe Woods in Milford and Long Branch Farm & Trails in Goshen-which together provide 1,600 acres of forests, fields, streams, and ponds, with many miles of hiking trails. But the pièce de résistance for younger nature lovers is really the PlayScape natural playground, where kids are encouraged to engage with nature as they dig, pick flowers, splash in a stream, and more. Also seriously cool: a daily nature-focused preschool, bird-watching programs, and guided full-moon walks.

TACOMA NATURE CENTER Tacoma WA

The Tacoma Nature Center features 71 acres of protected land, wetlands, and forests. Start with a walk around 17-acre Snake Lake, which gets its name from its long and curvy shape. As you cross the trail's first bridge, be on the lookout for the turtles and ducks that like to use the area's floating logs to catch some sun during spring, summer, and early fall. Once you've completed the loop, head over to the Discovery Pond area, where kids can enjoy nature as they climb into a tree house, slide down a hollow log, and scramble across boulders.
